

## Manual Wind Up Watches

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A manual winding watch is also known as a mechanical watch, meaning you must wind it yourself to power it. A mainspring is used to store energy in mechanical watches. Unlike an automatic watch, manual watches do not wind themselves while they're being worn. However, many automatic movements can also be wound manually.

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Manual watches, as the name suggests, require periodic winding by-hand — usually meaning the crown must be turned to wind the internal springs of the timepiece so that it will keep ticking. Alternatively, automatic watches skip this step entirely — most often by using the kinetic energy produced by the wearer to wind their internal springs.
